Did you know?

Emst Rohm was was one of the first members of the Nazi Party He took part in the Beer-Hall Putsch of 1923, but after the trial he was released. After the victory of the Nazis in the 1930 election he was appointed commander of the SA by Hitler, which at that time had about 170,000 members. Following the Nazi seizure of power Rohm wanted the SA to be incorporated into the German Army He was bitterly opposed by high ranking army officers and by Hitler, who was afraid that Rohm would try to seize power as the head of a military government. Hitler ordered the liquidation of the SA. On June 30, 1934 Rohm and other SA leaders were arrested and shot - this purge was later known as "The Night of the Long Knives."
